Many members of the Columbus community have attended a mass at St. Joseph the Workman Cathedral in downtown LaCrosse, but did you know that St. Joseph the Workman is the patron saint of the Diocese of LaCrosse? St. Joseph was Jesus' foster father and the spouse of



Blessed Mother Mary. He was a carpenter by trade and passed his knowledge and skills on to Jesus. Many people picture Joseph as a caring, gentle man, but many scripture scholars believe he also must have been quite intimidating and brave to safeguard Mary and Jesus as they traveled through Egypt to protect Jesus from King Herod's Massacre of the Innocents. St. Joseph's feast day is celebrated on March 19th and the feast of St. Joseph the Workman is May 1st. Both of these special days were established to celebrate the virtuous life of St. Joseph, Jesus' earthly father. St. Joseph is the patron saint of a happy death because Church tradition tells us that he died in the arms of Mary and Jesus. He is also the patron and protector of the Universal Catholic Church.

April Fool's Day, also known as All Fool's Day, is a widely celebrated tradition taking place on April 1st, though it's not a national holiday anywhere. When did this day of pranks first begin?

There isn't a definite historical origin but there are a few speculations.

One common theory is that it originated around the Vernal Equinox, the first day of spring, as

Mother Nature fools us by changing the weather. Tied to this is the Roman festival called "Hilaria." People would dress up in disguises and mock others.

Another possibility started in France. In 1582, France had transitioned from using the Julian calendar, which was around the end of March to the beginning of April that year, to using the Gregorian calendar. Some people didn't change or didn't know to change so they were laughed at for it.

A:Then: Went out for breakfast before school. Now: Take my family out to breakfast before school.


Q: What makes a "good day" at school?


grade school when our school team would play a basketball game against the parents to end the season.







Uptown Coffee in Marshfield is a fairly new place but their coffee is already well known and delicious. They offer in-person coffee as well as takeout which you can order online and they will bring to your car. I recently ordered the snickerdoodle latte and a cinnamon roll. Their cinnamon rolls are rather large and have the perfect ratio of cinnamon to pastry to frosting. They taste even better warmed up. Rockin' Recipes by Jayden Pankratz

As the Lenten season comes to an end you get ready bottom of an ungreased 9x13 inch pan. to spend Easter with your family. You gave up sweets for Lent and you know that it is finally time to make the one thing that your heart desires: **lemon** bars. Grabbing all of the ingredients you make your favorite springtime guilty pleasure. As they bake, your mouth begins to water as you think of their tart and sweet flavor. You will have to wait until tomorrow when you can finally enjoy your delicious creation.

Lemon Bars

1 cup butter, softened $\frac{1}{2}$ cup white sugar 2 cups all-purpose flour 4 eggs $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups white sugar ¹/₄ cup all-purpose flour 2 lemons, juiced Step 1: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F Step 2: In a medium bowl, blend together softened butter, 2 cups flour and 1/2 cup sugar. Press into the

Step 3: Bake for 15 to 20 minutes in the preheated oven, or until firm and golden. In another bowl, whisk together the remaining 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/4 cup flour. Whisk in the eggs and lemon juice. Pour over the baked crust.

Step 4: Bake for an additional 20 minutes in the preheated oven. The bars will firm up as they cool.




